

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he nonprofit League of Conservation Voters (LCV) has published a *National Environmental Scorecard* every Congress since 1970, the year it was founded by leaders of the environmental movement following the first Earth Day. LCV works to turn environmental values into national, state and local priorities.

This edition of the *National Environmental Scorecard* provides objective, factual information about the most important environmental legislation considered and the corresponding voting records of all members of the second session of the 113th Congress. This *Scorecard* represents the consensus of experts from about 20 respected environmental and conservation organizations who selected the key votes on which members of Congress should be scored. LCV scores votes on the most important issues of the year, including energy, climate change, public health, public lands and wildlife conservation, and spending for environmental programs. The votes included in this *Scorecard* presented members of Congress with a real choice and help distinguish which legislators are working for environmental protection. Except in rare circumstances, the *Scorecard* excludes consensus action on the environment and issues on which no recorded votes occurred.

Dedicated environmentalists and national leaders volunteered their time to identify and research crucial votes. We extend special thanks to our Board of Directors, Issues & Accountability Committee, and Scorecard Advisory Committee for their valuable input.



2014 OVERVIEW

The American public's growing concern about climate change in 2014 stands in stark contrast to the anti-environment agenda and votes of the U.S. House of Representatives, as detailed in this year's *National Environmental Scorecard*. Fortunately, the House's breathtaking attacks on our air, water, lands, and wildlife were blocked by our allies in the U.S. Senate, who grew even more vocal this year about the urgency of addressing climate change. We were also thrilled by the progress made by President Barack Obama, who continued using his executive authority to build on his historic record on climate change and other environmental priorities.

Again this year, the impacts of climate change broke records, further motivating the American people to call for climate action. 2014 registered as the hottest year on Earth since record-keeping began in 1880, punctuating a trend that includes 14 of the 15 hottest years recorded this century. This warming is just one of the many impacts of dangerous carbon pollution—including rising sea levels, ocean acidification, and drought in some areas and flooding in others—each of which was detailed in this year's National Climate Assessment, the most comprehensive and authoritative scientific report ever produced about climate's impacts on the United States and our economy. This growing evidence of climate change helped mobilize more than 300,000 people to march this fall in New York City and tens of thousands more in cities around the world.

In spite of these developments, the House of Representatives continued its assault on the environment for the fourth year in a row. Indeed, the 35 House votes included in this *Scorecard* are tied with 2011 and 2012 for the most votes ever scored, with the second highest total—28 votes—having come in 2013. This is a trend—year after year the

Republican leadership of the House has chosen the polluters' agenda. So much so, in fact, that many other 2014 votes warranted inclusion and would have been included in a typical year, but did not make the top 35 votes.

Just as they did in the last several years, the House seemingly left no environmental issue untouched in 2014. There were attacks on our cornerstone environmental laws, like the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, National Environmental Policy Act and the Endangered Species Act. There were votes to legislatively approve the dirty and dangerous Keystone XL tar sands pipeline, to dramatically expand risky oil drilling off our beaches and on public lands, and to prevent new parks from being created. Basic science itself was not spared, as the House voted against an amendment affirming the scientific consensus of man-made climate change and in favor of blocking the EPA's ability to use the best peer-reviewed science when determining levels of pollution that protect public health. While our allies in the Senate successfully blocked these attacks, they serve as a harbinger of the anti-environment agenda we can expect from both chambers of the 114th Congress, now jointly led by climate change deniers.

Thanks to the stalwart leadership of Majority Leader Harry Reid, most of the House-passed anti-environment legislation never reached the Senate floor. Those attacks that did come for a vote were defeated, such as a bill to approve the Keystone XL pipeline. Indeed, the small number of votes included in this year's Senate *Scorecard* is testament to the fact that much worthwhile legislation stood no chance in the face of opposition from an anti-environment minority. That is not to say that attempts were not made. But common sense legislation to extend clean energy tax credits or reduce the influence of big corporations and other special interest polluters in our elections—a major contributor to the anti-environmental turn of Congress in the post-*Citizens United* era—fell short of the 60 votes needed.

While the Senate may not have had the votes to legislate one way or another on the environment, that did not stop our allies in both chambers from speaking out more forcefully than ever on the need to address climate change. More than 30 Senators took to the Senate floor in March to urge action on climate change as part of a historic, all-night session dubbed "Up for Climate." At a May rally in the Senate, hundreds of attendees and more than 30 Members of Congress all programmed their smartphones to ring simultaneously to symbolically "Sound the Alarm for Climate Action."

For his part, President Obama continued taking historic steps to address climate change and advance other environmental priorities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a common sense yet ambitious proposal known as the Clean Power Plan to establish, for the first time ever, national limits on carbon pollution from our

nation's existing fleet of power plants, which are responsible for one-third of all domestic greenhouse gas emissions. As part of President Obama's commitment to lead international efforts addressing climate change, the United States and China made a historic joint announcement pledging to take steps on climate and clean energy, and President Obama pledged a \$3 billion U.S. contribution to the international Green Climate Fund to help developing countries cope with the impacts of climate change.


The administration's environmental progress this year wasn't limited to climate action. The EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers jointly released a Clean Water Rule that would protect wetlands and small streams from pollution or destruction, safeguarding waters that approximately 117 million Americans rely on for clean drinking water. And President Obama used his authority to protect several stunning Western landscapes as National Monuments and expand the existing Pacific Remote Islands Marine National Monument into the largest marine preserve in the world that is off limits to commercial resource extraction.



2014 SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. UNDERMINING FLOOD INSURANCE REFORM

Representative Michael Grimm (R-NY) sponsored H.R. 3370, the Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act of 2014, which would repeal and delay key provisions of the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012. Artificially discounted flood insurance rates have led to the development and destruction of floodplains. By undermining steps to increase flood insurance premiums to market-based levels, H.R. 3370 would encourage further floodplain development and lead to the destruction of wetlands, forests, and other habitats that help mitigate flood damage, which will only be made worse by climate change. On March 13, the Senate passed H.R. 3370 by a vote of 72-22 (Senate roll call vote 78). **NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.** President Obama signed H.R. 3370 into law on March 21.

2. CLEAN ENERGY TAX CREDITS

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Ron Wyden (D-OR) offered a substitute amendment to H.R. 3474, the Hire More Heroes Act of 2014, which would extend dozens of tax incentives, including vital clean energy tax credits. The package of tax extenders, known collectively as the Expiring Provisions Improvement Reform and Efficiency (EXPIRE) Act, would extend several energy efficiency incentives and the Production Tax Credit (PTC), which is particularly critical to the continued growth of wind energy. Clean energy tax credits like the PTC have a proven track record of increasing investment, decreasing costs, creating jobs, and reducing pollution. On May 15, the Senate rejected the motion to end debate and proceed to the EXPIRE Act by a vote of 53-40 (60 votes were needed to invoke cloture; Senate roll call vote 157). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. President Obama signed a shorter-term tax extenders package that included the PTC into law on December 19; however, this only extended tax credits through the end of 2014.

3. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW IN TRANSPORTATION REBUILDING

Senator Pat Toomey (R-PA) offered an amendment to H.R. 5021, the Highway and Transportation Funding Act of 2014, which would exempt the post-disaster rebuilding of transportation infrastructure that was closed for safety reasons from any environmental reviews, approvals, licensing, or permitting. In doing so, the amendment would threaten the environment and public health and roll back bedrock environmental laws like the Clean Water Act, the National Environmental Policy Act, and the Endangered Species Act, even though these laws already provide flexibility and waivers for emergency situations. On July 29, the Senate rejected the Toomey amendment by a vote of 47-50 (Senate roll call vote 247). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.



4. DEMOCRACY FOR ALL CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Senator Tom Udall (D-NM) sponsored S.J. Res. 19, an amendment to the Constitution of the United States relating to contributions and expenditures intended to affect elections. This resolution would be a historic step toward reducing the influence of big corporations and other special interest polluters in our elections and restoring the voice of the American people. While amendments to the Constitution are of serious consequence and should not be taken lightly, the dramatic increase of money in politics since the disastrous *Citizens United* U.S. Supreme Court decision has allowed special interests to spend unlimited amounts of money to protect their ability to pollute our air and water. On September 11, the Senate rejected the motion to end debate and proceed to S.J. Res. 19 by a vote of 54-42. (60 votes were needed to invoke cloture; Senate roll call vote 261). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

5. KEYSTONE XL TAR SANDS PIPELINE (KXL)

Senators John Hoeven (R-ND) and Mary Landrieu (D-LA) sponsored S. 2280, a bill to automatically approve the Keystone XL tar sands pipeline, which would transport the world's dirtiest oil through the American heartland to an international shipping port on the Gulf Coast where it would be exported. Keystone XL would lead to a significant expansion of tar sands development, unleashing massive amounts of carbon pollution and threatening surrounding communities, ecosystems, and watersheds including the Ogallala aquifer, which provides drinking water for millions of Americans. Despite these threats, Keystone XL would create just 35 permanent jobs and would not enhance American energy independence. S. 2280 would short circuit the federal approval process, eliminating the State Department's ability to assess whether the pipeline is in the national interest and the President's authority to ultimately approve or reject the project. On November 18, the Senate rejected S. 2280 by a vote of 59-41 (60 votes were needed for passage; Senate roll call vote 280). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

2014 HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. SUPERFUND CLEANUP

Representative Cory Gardner (R-CO) sponsored H.R. 2279, the Reducing Excessive Deadline Obligations Act of 2013, which would significantly reduce the number of cleanups of toxic waste sites, putting communities and the environment at risk through increased exposure to dangerous pollutants. H.R. 2279 weakens the Superfund law and the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), the law governing the disposal of hazardous wastes. This reckless legislation would also limit liability for polluters and waste taxpayer dollars by transferring the financial burden of cleaning up Superfund sites from the polluter to the federal government. On January 9, the House approved H.R. 2279 by a vote of 225-188 (House roll call vote 10). **NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.** The Senate took no action on this legislation.

2. CLIMATE CHANGE & PUBLIC LANDS

Representative Rush Holt (D-NJ) offered an amendment to H.R. 3590, the Sportsmen's Heritage and Recreational Enhancement (SHARE) Act of 2013, which would allow the Interior Secretary to consider the effects of climate change when making decisions related to conservation and recreation on public lands. Through droughts, warmer temperatures, raging wildfires, and other impacts, climate change is already affecting lands and wildlife across the country. On February 5, the House rejected the Holt amendment by a vote of 181-242 (House roll call vote 39). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

3. PUBLIC LANDS ASSAULT

Representative Bob Latta (R-OH) sponsored H.R. 3590, the Sportsmen's Heritage and Recreational Enhancement (SHARE) Act of 2013, which contains harmful measures undermining the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the Wilderness Act, and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The bill includes language that could allow the use of motorized vehicles, road construction, and other forms of development within protected wilderness areas, and it blocks input from public stakeholders in National Wildlife Refuge management decisions. This legislation also includes provisions that would weaken the EPA's ability to regulate toxic lead in ammunition and adds new exemptions for chemicals used in fishing equipment. Additionally, this bill would undermine the Endangered Species Act and Marine Mammal Protection Act by allowing the importation of polar bear trophies from Canada, which encourages hunters to kill protected species in other countries and then seek legal waivers from Congress after the fact. On February 5, the House approved H.R. 3590 by a vote of 268-154 (House roll call vote 41). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. On July 10, the Senate failed to invoke cloture on legislation containing many of these provisions, S. 2363, the Bipartisan Sportsmen's Act of 2014.

4. CALIFORNIA WATER RESOURCES

Representative David Valadao (R-CA) sponsored H.R. 3964, the Sacramento-San Joaquin Valley Emergency Water Delivery Act, which would eliminate state and federal environmental protections for California's rivers, threaten water quality in California's Bay-Delta estuary, and undermine the reliability of the state's water supplies. This bill would derail implementation of a bipartisan package of water policy reform bills adopted in 2009 and would eliminate desperately-needed protections for salmon and native fisheries, putting thousands of fishing jobs at risk. This legislation prioritizes the interests of large agribusinesses and uses California's current low water supplies as an excuse to weaken federal and state environmental laws, when the real driver is the historic drought afflicting the state. On February 5, the House approved H.R. 3964 by a vote of 229-191 (House roll call vote 50). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

5. BROAD ATTACK ON LANDS & WILDLIFE

Representative Jeff Miller (R-FL) sponsored H.R. 2954, the Public Access and Lands Improvement Act, which would promote harmful logging and greatly hinder the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, and the U.S. Forest Service in their implementation of conservation strategies that protect threatened species. The legislation includes provisions that would undermine conservation protections at Cape Hatteras National Seashore and obstruct reviews of grazing leases that are critical in protecting imperiled species such as the greater sage-grouse. It also requires harmful salvage logging on over 150,000 acres of the Stanislaus National Forest, which was impacted by the California Rim Fire, and impedes the public's ability to seek administrative and judicial review. On February 6, the House approved H.R. 2954 by a vote of 220-194 (House roll call vote 54). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

6. ASSAULT ON PUBLIC PROTECTIONS

Representative George Holding (R-NC) sponsored H.R. 2804, the Achieving Less Excess in Regulation and Requiring Transparency (ALERRT) Act of 2014, which would undermine our nation's ability to set health, safety and environmental standards. Specifically, H.R. 2804 would add a six-month delay to most rules essential to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of the American public, and it would force agencies to engage in a "race to the bottom" to pick the rule that is least costly to industry rather than the rule that will best protect public health. H.R. 2804 mandates wasteful new analyses that hold up life-saving agency actions and weakens the ability of citizens to prod agencies to follow the law. On February 27, the House approved H.R. 2804 by a vote of 236-179 (House roll call vote 78). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

7. UNDERMINING FLOOD INSURANCE REFORM

Representative Michael Grimm (R-NY) sponsored H.R. 3370, the Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act of 2014, which would repeal and delay key provisions of the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012. Artificially discounted flood insurance rates have led to the development and destruction of floodplains. By undermining steps to increase these premiums to market-based



levels, H.R. 3370 will encourage further floodplain development and lead to the destruction of wetlands, forests, and other habitats that help mitigate flood damage, which will only be made worse by a changing climate. On March 4, the House passed H.R. 3370 by a vote of 306-91 (House roll call vote 91). **NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE**. The Senate subsequently passed H.R. 3370 and President Obama signed this legislation into law on March 21.

8. CLIMATE CHANGE SCIENCE

Representative Jan Schakowsky (D-IL) offered an amendment to H.R. 3826, the Electricity Security and Affordability Act, which would require Congress to accept the scientific findings that man-made carbon pollution contributes to climate change and that climate change has a wide range of negative effects. 2014 was the hottest year on record and communities across the U.S. are already feeling the impacts of climate change, ranging from costly droughts to deadly forest fires to more severe storms. On March 6, the Schakowsky amendment was rejected 190-221 (House roll call vote 103). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

9. CARBON POLLUTION

House Energy and Power Subcommittee Chairman Ed Whitfield (R-KY) sponsored H.R. 3826, the Electricity Security and Affordability Act, which would prevent the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from limiting carbon emissions from power plants, the nation's largest source of the pollution driving climate change. The devastating impacts of climate change are occurring right outside our windows in the form of more frequent and severe weather events like droughts, wildfires, floods, and storms. Climate change also threatens public health by increasing smog, which triggers asthma attacks and is especially dangerous for children and those with heart or lung disease. The U.S. already places limits on mercury, arsenic, particulate matter, lead and other pollution from power plants, but this extreme legislation would ensure that power plants remain free to release unlimited amounts of carbon pollution into our air. On March 6, the House approved H.R. 3826 by a vote of 229-183 (House roll call vote 106). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

10. ATTACKING PUBLIC INPUT & ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

Representative Tom Marino (R-PA) sponsored H.R. 2641, the Responsibly and Professionally Invigorating Development (RAPID) Act of 2013, which would severely undermine the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) compromising the quality of environmental reviews and interfering with the public's right to provide input in the management of public resources. H.R. 2641 would set arbitrary review deadlines and restrict the range of project alternatives that federal agencies can consider. It would also jeopardize the integrity of the decision-making process by allowing project sponsors to prepare environmental review documents, which is a conflict of interest. Moreover, while presented as an effort to increase timeliness and efficiency, the RAPID Act could actually lead to delays by forcing stakeholders into court preemptively simply to preserve their right to judicial review. On March 6, the House approved H.R. 2641 by a vote of 229-179 (House roll call vote 113). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.



11. TOXIC MINING WASTE

Representative Bill Johnson (R-OH) sponsored H.R. 2824, the Preventing Government Waste and Protecting Coal Mining Jobs in America Act, which would nullify safeguards that prevent the dumping of dangerous mining waste into our waterways. The bill would eliminate a commonsense Reaganera rule requiring a 100-foot buffer zone around waterways to protect them from toxic coal mining waste, and it would reinstate a 2008 rule that was recently struck down in federal court. The 2008 rule would exempt the most destructive mining practices from the buffer requirement, leaving streams and waterways vulnerable to sludge and other mining debris, especially in the Appalachian region. H.R. 2824 would also prohibit states from taking additional steps to protect communities from surface coal mining operations. On March 25, the House approved H.R. 2824 by a vote of 229-192 (House roll call vote 141). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate did not act on this legislation.

12. PREVENTING NEW PARKS

House Public Lands and Environmental Regulation Subcommittee Chairman Rob Bishop (R-UT) sponsored H.R. 1459, the Ensuring Public Involvement in the Creation of National Monuments Act, which would gut America's most important conservation tool, the Antiquities Act. The bill would undermine the President's authority under the Antiquities Act to protect historical, cultural, and natural sites by designating them as National Monuments, and would therefore serve as the biggest rollback of our nation's ability to conserve land in more than a century. With Congress refusing to advance dozens of locally-supported bills—from members of both parties—that would create new national parks and other conservation areas, a vote for H.R. 1459 amounts to a vote in favor of preventing new parks from being created. On March 26, the House approved H.R. 1459 by a vote of 222-201 (House roll call vote 147). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

13. BIG OIL BUDGET

House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan (R-WI) sponsored H. Con. Res. 96, the Fiscal Year 2015 Budget Resolution, which would slash funding far beyond the already crippling sequestration levels for important priorities such as national parks, environmental safeguards, infrastructure, and health and energy research. While making drastic cuts to programs that protect our air, water, and open spaces, the Ryan budget would continue billions of dollars in subsidies to the oil industry and lower Big Oil's tax bill even further by reducing corporate income tax rates. It would even sell lands that belong to the American public to benefit private energy companies. On April 10, the House approved H. Con. Res. 96 by a vote of 219-205 (House roll call vote 177). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

14. BLOCKING CLIMATE ACTION IN TRADE AGREEMENTS

Representative Mark Meadows (R-NC) offered an amendment to H.R. 4660, the Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would prohibit any funds in the bill from being used to negotiate or enter into a trade agreement that includes a limit on carbon pollution.

This amendment would limit the administration's ability to work with other nations to address climate change, which poses a severe threat to our economy, health, and environment. On May 30, the House approved the Meadows amendment by a vote of 226-179 (House roll call vote 267). NO IS THE PROENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Meadows amendment was not included in H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal

(also referred to as the CRomnibus), which was signed into law by President Obama on December 16.

15. MILITARY INVESTMENTS IN ADVANCED BIOFUELS

Representative Paul Gosar (R-AZ) offered an amendment to H.R. 4870, the Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 2015, which would prohibit any funds in the bill from being used to replace petroleum-based fuels with advanced drop-in biofuels. The Department of Defense is the single largest energy user in the nation, and investing in renewable biofuels significantly reduces pollution and the military's carbon footprint. Advanced biofuels also enhance American energy security by giving the military more fuel options and reducing its dependence on oil. On June 20, the House rejected the Gosar amendment by a vote of 205-208 (House roll call vote 334). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

16. GUTTING PIPELINE REVIEW

House Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman Fred Upton (R-MI) sponsored H.R.3301, the North American Energy Infrastructure Act, a bill that would effectively exempt cross-border pipelines from the National Environmental Policy Act. H.R. 3301 would narrow environmental review to the cross-border segment of proposed pipelines, would instate default approval of any cross-border pipeline within 120 days of completion of the review, and would also exempt any modifications to existing pipelines from review. H.R. 3301 undermines the federal government's ability to fully assess the environmental impacts of proposed pipelines. On June 24, the House approved H.R.3301 by a vote of 238-173 (House roll call vote 354). **NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE**. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

17. LIQUEFIED NATURAL GAS (LNG) EXPORTS

Representative Cory Gardner (R-CO) sponsored H.R. 6, the Domestic Prosperity and Global Freedom Act, which would entirely cut the Department of Energy (DOE) out of the approval process for liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports to most of the world. Expanded LNG exports would lead to increased fracking, which is not properly regulated, pollutes our air and our water, and is connected to a number of health problems for people living nearby fracking operations. By automatically granting DOE approval for LNG exports to all 159 countries that are members of the World Trade Organization, rather than just the 20 countries with whom the U.S. has a Free Trade Agreement, H.R. 6 would eliminate the agency's ability to consider the full range of impacts these exports could have on public health and the environment. On June 25, the House approved H.R. 6 by a vote of 266-150 (House roll call vote 359). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

18. NATIONAL OCEAN POLICY

Representative Alan Lowenthal (D-CA) offered an amendment to H.R.4899, the Lowering Gasoline Prices to Fuel an America That Works Act of 2014, which would strike language in the underlying bill prohibiting the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management and the Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement from coordinating with coastal states, the public, and other stakeholders on programs and plans to ensure the safe and productive use of our nation's oceans and Great Lakes. The National Ocean Policy, created by an Executive Order, directs government agencies with differing mandates to work together to improve ocean health and also ensures that all competing interests, including conservationists, fishermen, scientists, shipping companies, port managers, energy developers, and those who live and work in ocean communities all have a voice in creating solutions for the many problems facing our oceans. On June 26, the House rejected the Lowenthal amendment by a vote of 179-232 (House roll call vote 361). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

19. OFFSHORE DRILLING SUBSIDIES

Representative Earl Blumenauer (D-OR) offered an amendment to H.R.4899, the Lowering Gasoline Prices to Fuel an America That Works Act of 2014, which would require companies to renegotiate leases that require no payment of royalties to the United States before bidding on new leases authorized by the underlying bill. This amendment closes a key royalty payment loophole and would save taxpayers billions of dollars. On June 26, the House rejected the Blumenauer amendment by a vote of 179-229 (House roll call vote 364). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

20. BIG OIL GIVEAWAY

House Natural Resources Committee Chairman Doc Hastings (R-WA) sponsored H.R. 4899, the Lowering Gasoline Prices to Fuel an America That Works Act, which would prioritize drilling on our public lands and waters over other activities such as hiking, hunting, and fishing. Such a mandate subverts the multiple uses our public lands have historically been managed for, and it would harm businesses that comprise our nation's \$646 billion outdoor recreation economy. The bill would also put the Atlantic and California coasts at risk of an oil spill by expanding risky offshore drilling to these areas while increasing perverse incentives for more drilling by directing additional revenue from federally-owned oil resources to coastal states. On June 26, the House approved H.R. 4899 by a vote of 229-185 (House roll call vote 368). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

21. CLEAN ENERGY FUNDING

Representative Bradley Byrne (R-AL) offered an amendment to H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would eliminate all funding in the bill for the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy (EERE). DOE-led clean energy programs have helped drive innovation in energy technologies while significantly reducing the costs of these technologies. The Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy supports critical solar, wind, efficiency, and clean vehicle programs that help create jobs, reduce pollution, and increase our energy security. On July 9, the House rejected the Byrne amendment by a vote of 110-310 (House roll call vote 376). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

22. SOCIAL COST OF CARBON

Representative James Lankford (R-OK) offered an amendment to H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would force federal agencies to turn a blind eye to the economic costs of climate change. Climate change already costs communities billions of dollars each year across the country, and this anti-science amendment would prevent the government from considering the costs of extreme weather and other climate change impacts or the savings from government actions to improve energy efficiency and reduce carbon pollution. On July 10, the House approved the Lankford amendment by a vote of 227-191 (House roll call vote 389). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Lankford amendment was not included in H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal (also referred to as the CRomnibus), which was signed into law by President Obama on December 16.

23. LIGHT BULB EFFICIENCY STANDARDS

Representative Michael Burgess (R-TX) offered an amendment to H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would prevent the Department of Energy (DOE) from implementing or enforcing commonsense energy efficiency standards for light bulbs. Rolling back these standards, which were enacted in 2007 with strong bipartisan and industry support, would threaten jobs, cost consumers money, and worsen pollution. It would also allow foreign manufacturers to sell old, inefficient light bulbs in the United States, which is unfair to domestic manufacturers who have already invested millions of dollars in plants that can produce more efficient bulbs that meet the standards. On July 10, the House approved the Burgess amendment by a vote of 226-193 (House roll call vote 393). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Burgess amendment was included in H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal (also referred to as the CRomnibus), which was signed into law by President Obama on December 16.

24. ATTACK ON CLEAN WATER

Representative Doug LaMalfa (R-CA) offered an amendment to H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would undermine the Clean Water Act and jeopardize the waters Americans depend on for drinking, swimming, fishing, and flood protection. This amendment would repeal part of the Clean Water Act that currently provides limited exemptions for normal, on-going farm practices and discharges of dredged or fill material related to the maintenance of drainage ditches, and expand these exemptions in a way that would encourage new wetland and stream destruction. For example, a highway department cleaning out a maintenance ditch could dump excess material into a pristine lake, filling it in or obstructing its water flow without requiring any review under the law. On July 10, the House approved the LaMalfa amendment by a vote of 239-182 (House roll call vote 394). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. A modified version of the LaMalfa amendment was included in H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal (also referred to as the CRomnibus) signed into law by President Obama on December 16.

25. IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Representative David McKinley (R-WV) offered an amendment to H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which would prevent federal agencies from assessing the costs and dangers posed by climate change. This extreme anti-science amendment would make it more difficult for agencies to take part in studying or planning for the increase in extreme weather associated with climate change. It would also block these agencies from participating in the National Climate Assessment, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, and any analysis of the cost of carbon pollution. On July 10, the House passed the McKinley Amendment by a vote of 229-188 (House roll call vote 397). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The McKinley amendment was not included in H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal (also referred to as the CRomnibus), which was signed into law by President Obama on December 16.

26. ASSAULT ON CLEAN ENERGY & CLEAN WATER

House Energy and Water Development Appropriations Subcommittee Chair Michael Simpson (R-ID) introduced H.R. 4923, the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, which moves us backward on energy and environmental policy by slashing funding for renewable energy and energy efficiency while boosting funding for dirty fossil fuel and nuclear generation technologies. Although the impacts of climate change are already being felt around the country, this bill attacks the science of climate change as well as the government's ability to assess the real costs of climate change impacts and the benefits of improving energy efficiency and limiting carbon pollution. In addition, the bill contains damaging policy riders that would limit the Army Corps of Engineers' ability to safeguard the waters Americans depend on for drinking, swimming, fishing, and flood protection. On July 10, the House approved H.R. 4923 by a vote of 253-170 (House roll call vote 402). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. H.R. 83, the FY 15 spending deal (also referred to as the CRomnibus), which was signed into law by President Obama on December 16, included higher funding levels for renewable energy and energy efficiency; however, it also included several harmful policy riders.

27. USING BEST AVAILABLE SCIENCE

Representative Rush Holt (D-NJ) offered an amendment to H.R. 4315, the Endangered Species Transparency and Reasonableness Act, which would remove the requirement in the underlying bill that causes data submitted by state, county, or tribal governments, whether by experts or not, to supersede that offered by the federal government and be considered the "best scientific and commercial data available." This underlying requirement would undermine the federal government's ability to use the best data when assessing a given project's environmental impact. On July 29, the Holt amendment was



defeated by a vote of 204-215 (House roll call vote 461). YES IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE.

28. ATTACK ON THE ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT (ESA)

House Natural Resources Committee Chairman Doc Hastings (R-WA) sponsored H.R. 4315, the Endangered Species Transparency and Reasonableness Act, which would undermine the Endangered Species Act. H.R. 4315 would waste precious taxpayer resources by mandating expensive online databases that would only serve to increase bureaucracy and stand in the way of a balanced approach to conservation. It would also jeopardize the use of legitimate science by allowing any data submitted to agencies from states, tribes or counties to be dubbed the best available science – even if there wasn't a single scientist involved in the process. Moreover, it would limit the ability of American citizens to obtain counsel and challenge illegal government activities, undermining public involvement from across the political spectrum. On July 29, the House approved H.R. 4315 by a vote of 233-190 (House roll call vote 463). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

29. PESTICIDES POLLUTION

Representative Bob Gibbs (R-OH) sponsored H.R. 935, the Reducing Regulatory Burdens Act of 2014, which would undermine the Clean Water Act by preventing the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from protecting waterways from the direct application of pesticides that can contaminate drinking water, harm aquatic species, and negatively impact the food chain. H.R. 935 would render ineffective the Clean Water Act pesticide general permit, which took effect in 2011 and laid out commonsense practices for applying pesticides directly to waters under the jurisdiction of the Clean Water Act. The pesticide general permit allows for spraying to combat vector-borne diseases such as the West Nile virus, and it has had no significant effect on farming practices. On July 31, the House approved H.R. 935 by a vote of 267-161 (House roll call vote 470). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

30. ASSAULT ON THE CLEAN WATER RULE

Representative Steve Southerland (R-FL) sponsored H.R. 5078, the Waters of the United States Regulatory Overreach Protection Act of 2014, which would allow the continued dumping of pollution into our small streams and wetlands by preventing the Environmental Protection Agency and the Army Corps of Engineers from moving forward with their proposed Clean Water Rule. This commonsense rule would clarify Clean Water Act protections for the small streams, wetlands, headwaters, and tributaries that impact the drinking water of over 117 million Americans, support businesses and recreation, and are crucial habitat for wildlife. H.R. 5078 would stop this rule in its tracks, closing the public comment period and ensuring the voices of polluters trump demands for clean water. H.R. 5078 also prohibits the EPA and the Army Corps from ever developing any "substantially similar" rule or guidance to protect these crucial waterways. On September 9, the House approved H.R. 5078 by a vote of 262-152 (House roll call vote 489). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action



on this legislation.

31. BIG POLLUTER GIVEAWAY

Representative Lee Terry (R-NE) sponsored H.R. 2, the American Energy Solutions for Lower Costs and More American Jobs Act, a package of more than a dozen bills – all of which had already passed the House. H.R. 2 amounts to a huge giveaway to big polluters and threatens the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the landscapes that support our outdoor economy. The bill also thwarts progress on climate change and compromises communities' ability to weigh in on projects in their own backyards. H.R. 2 would gut the EPA's ability to limit carbon pollution from power plants. It would disregard due process and endanger public health and the environment in order to rush a decision on the dirty and dangerous Keystone XL pipeline. It would also elevate drilling above all other uses on our public lands, including hiking, fishing, and hunting, subverting the multiple uses that have guided public lands management and threatening outdoor recreation-related businesses and communities that depend on this industry. On September 18, the House approved H.R. 2 by a vote of 226-191 (House roll call vote 515). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

32. KEYSTONE XL TAR SANDS PIPELINE (KXL)

Representative Bill Cassidy (R-LA) sponsored H.R. 5682, a bill to automatically approve the Keystone XL tar sands pipeline, which would transport the world's dirtiest oil through the American heartland to an international shipping port on the Gulf Coast where it would be exported. Keystone XL would lead to a significant expansion of tar sands development, unleashing massive amounts of carbon pollution and threatening surrounding communities, ecosystems, and watersheds including the Ogallala aquifer, which provides drinking water for millions of Americans. Despite these threats, Keystone XL would create just 35 permanent jobs and would not enhance American energy independence. H.R. 5682 would short circuit the federal approval process, eliminating the State Department's ability to assess whether the pipeline is in the national interest and the President's authority to ultimately approve or reject the project. On November 14, the House approved H.R. 5682 by a vote of 252-161 (House roll call vote 519). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate rejected similar legislation forcing approval of the Keystone XL pipeline, S. 2280, on November 18.

33. ATTACK ON SCIENTIFIC INTEGRITY

Representative Chris Stewart (R-UT) sponsored H.R.1422, the EPA Science Advisory Board Reform Act, which would undermine the ability of the EPA's Science Advisory Board to provide independent scientific advice to the agency. H.R. 1422 would undermine the integrity of the Science Advisory Board by allowing industry participation and making it more difficult for subject experts to serve on the Board. H.R. 1422 would also impose new burdens on the Board that would delay necessary public health and environmental protections. On November 18, the House approved H.R.1422 by a vote of 229-191 (House roll call vote 525). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on



this legislation.

34. ATTACK ON SOUND SCIENCE

Representative David Schweikert (R-AZ) sponsored H.R. 4012, the Secret Science Reform Act of 2014, which would cripple the ability of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to use the best available science in setting critical public health safeguards. H.R. 4012 would severely restrict the scope of scientific studies that the EPA is able to use when setting health standards by prohibiting the use of peer-reviewed studies with confidential health information. This type of study is the basis for the best research on the effects of pollution on people. On November 19, the House approved H.R. 4012 by a vote of 237-190 (House roll call vote 528). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.

35. UNDERMINING CLEAN AIR PROTECTIONS

Representative Steve Scalise (R-LA) sponsored H.R. 4795, the Promoting New Manufacturing Act, which would undermine clean air protections by exempting newly permitted industrial facilities from certain air quality standards required under the Clean Air Act. H.R. 4795 would lead to increased air pollution, threaten public health, create unclear procedural requirements for businesses, and delay the permitting process. On November 20, the House approved H.R. 4795 by a vote of 238-172 (House roll call vote 531). NO IS THE PRO-ENVIRONMENT VOTE. The Senate took no action on this legislation.
